GERARD MAJELLA: JOYFUL WITNESS TO AND FOR LIFE

Today, St. Gerard Majella is most often invoked as the unofficial patron of people wishing to conceive, and of women experiencing difficulties in pregnancy. How did this come to be? There are a number of stories that date from Gerard's earthly life that point to him as an intercessor for life. Some say his frail health gave him compassion for ailing mothers-to-be. Others cite his miraculous prayers for troubled pregnancies. Italian women called him il santo de felice parti, "the saint of happy childbirth." Perhaps the most probable cause for this invocation of St. Gerard lies in a simple event that later took on great meaning. Leaving a house after a visit, Gerard dropped a handkerchief. A daughter of the house ran after him to return the item, but Gerard refused to take is, saying, "Keep it; you might have need of it later." Later, in childbirth, this same woman was experiencing complications. She remembered the words of Gerard, and asked for the handkerchief to be placed on her abdomen, and the baby was safely delivered.



bishop, he had managed to 'keep a good smile on him.' He maintained this reputation for merriment through his years in the Congregation: questioned about a rumour that had been taking a dip in the sea, 'Gerard replied with a laugh...'; hearing the music of a village flute-player, 'he began to leap and dance'; sitting with the archbishop's secretary, 'he laughed at his jokes...'; on someone's beginning to play an air from a modern opera on the recreation room harpsichord, Gerard seized an astonished Father 'and danced round the room with him.' He was even caught grinning towards the Lord in the Tabernacle as he passed through the chapel.

Today, St. Gerard's joyful engagement in life, and his charitable outreach to the most abandoned people of his day leads us to consider him a saintly advocate and intercessor for life.
